PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

Summit Oaks II is an Intensive Residential Treatment facility licensed to serve 11 females ages 10 to 17 who have severe behavioral, emotional and educational problems. These females have been unsuccessful in several programs and can be aggressive. Summit Oaks II utilizes a variety of treatment modalities and techniques to include Reality Therapy/Choice Theory with an emphasis on relationships and individual responsibility. In addition, Cognitive Behavioral Therapy and Dialectical Behavior Therapy are utilized with an emphasis on teaching skills on how to manage behaviors and emotions. Incentive programs and individualized treatment plans are developed to meet the needs for specialized psychiatric and medical needs along with educational and developmental care. Therapists provide individual and family therapy to assist and carry out the individualized treatment plans. A wide array of group services is available to include anger management, step recovery and cultural awareness.

The location of Summit Oaks II allows youth to take advantage of a wide variety of specialized services available to them such as Occupational and Speech Therapy.

We define the treatment milieu at Abbott House as consisting of intensive/productive relationships, substantive activities and therapeutic intervention within a structured daily program. The program is a nurturing and educational model that is structured around the primacy of relationships with peers and staff members.

The environment provides physical safety, meaningful learning experiences and the opportunities to interact in continuous intensive relationships with others. These experiences provide the substance for beginning to trust others and to explore difficulties in social relationships. Here, in a supportive and controlled setting, the young person begins to confront herself, to gain new perspectives, to try new activities and to experience novel opportunities to learn more about herself.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

Canyon Hills Center is a psychiatric residential treatment center licensed for 25 youth, ages 10-17, with behavioral, emotional, and educational challenges. CHC utilizes Reality Therapy/Choice Theory, Dialectic Behavior and Cognitive Behavior Therapy as our treatment approach. Canyon Hills offers a specialized education program, extensive outdoor recreation, opportunities for community involvement and evidenced based programming.

CHC also offers individual counseling by licensed professional therapists. Counseling includes cognitive behavioral therapy, dialectic behavior therapy, play therapy, trauma recovery, healthy relationships, and family re-integration. CHC also offers specialized occupational therapy and sensory activities in our on-site occupational therapy rooms. Family counseling and aftercare are available. Families receive aftercare services for 3 months post-discharge.

CHC offers various groups on a weekly basis. Areas addressed in these groups include values clarification, decision making skills, anger management, appropriate sexuality, independent living skills, alcohol/drug addiction education and counseling, self-esteem building, mindfulness, and personal health and wellness.

CHC has extensive recreational opportunities; it utilizes Black Hills State University campus and the Black Hills. Activities include hiking, skiing, swimming, rock climbing, fishing and other outdoor recreation activities,

PRGRAM DESCRIPTION:

The adolescent sexual adjustment program is a long-term inpatient residential treatment program specially designed for adolescents who have sexually abused others. The youth in our facility frequently have many special needs as many have experienced dysfunctional families or have a history of sexual, physical or emotional abuse. Our residential treatment program is a 36-bed facility. Each youth has their own room with a specialized security system in the beds and sensors on the windows to provide their security and others. At Our Home, Inc. ASAP program we emphasize a group therapy atmosphere and a Core Milieu Program of Positive Peer Culture.

TREATMENT APPROACH:

1. Our Home, Inc. ASAP uses a systematic treatment strategy intended to help youth develop an understanding of the situations, events, and behaviors that led up to their offense and minimize the risk of re-offense.
2. The program consists of three stages and each stage has a set of specialized assignments to help the youth accomplish the goal of that particular stage. Family counseling is also an important part of the program to help families better understand their youth to maintain sexual safety when he returns to the home and community. Family staffings and educational groups are arranged throughout the program. Individual sessions are provided for youth on an as needed basis.
3. Chemical dependency services are also part of the ASAP program in which on-site AA is offered during the week for youth that have either completed treatment or are preparing to enter alcohol treatment. Relapse education, AA Alateen and step groups are provided on an as needed basis.
4. The ABEL Assessment is designed to objectively assess sexual arousal. We also administer the polygraph examination for the purpose of assessment. In addition, we also provide psychological assessments, that include intellectual, academic, and personality testing. The medical needs of youth are also attended to as we have a registered nurse on staff ensuring the highest quality care of our youth. Licensed professional staff provide clinical services in the areas of drug and alcohol assessment, inhalant assessment, neuropsychological assessment, and specialized transitional care. The on-site school program is staffed by certified special education elementary and secondary teachers.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

Our Home, Inc. Parkston/PRTF for at-risk youth utilizes a Positive Peer milieu approach, facilitated by continuous supervision of staff and intensive therapeutic work accomplished in group meetings. 90 minute Positive Peer group sessions are held five times a week. Youth are offered all professional services needed to assist them in re-entry in to the community in a manner that will enable them to function to their fullest. Youth are in direct contact with professional staff who teach behavior, living and social skills, independent living, continued enhancement of the steps of AA and Alateen and who facilitate youth in continuous problem solving. Other services include job employment, education and participation in extra curricular activities including community services, volunteerism and therapeutic recreation. The Parkston program includes three specialized groups to cover other therapeutic issues:

- An all male group offers assistance and support for those individuals who have completed chemical dependency in-patient treatment. This group offers assistance for individuals with victim issues as well as other behavior difficulties.
- A female Adolescent Sexual Adjustment Group offers continuous support and assistance to individuals who have been sexually victimized and or have sexually perpetrated on others.
- A female survivor group offers continued support and assistance to those individuals who have sexual issues and or have been victimized.

Each youth has a 30 day treatment plan review; these plans are designed from a Person centered approach that includes the youth, referral worker, Our Home treatment team, and family whenever involved/possible. In addition, members of the Female ASAP Group attend ASA/Peer Group Therapy sessions twice a week to address sexual issues such as victimization and perpetration and Female Survivor Program members attend once a week Peer Group therapy sessions to address sexual issues and or victimization issues. Both groups are taught healthy and safe dating skills and sexual practices. Family counseling is offered when necessary to meet the needs of the youth in problem resolution to the extent the family is willing to participate.

It is the philosophy of Our Home, Inc. that spiritual needs hold an important part in the development and holistic wellness of the young people in our care. Therefore, efforts are made to meet these needs through coordination of activities that are spiritually beneficial for the youth.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

The Our Home Rediscovery Program is located in a rural setting approximately three miles east of Huron, South Dakota. The program is an intense 45-60 day program designed specifically to provide drug and alcohol treatment services to youth...The Rediscovery program also has a short Term Relapse Treatment Program. This program is an intensive 7-18 day program designed for adolescents that have already been through treatment and have relapsed in the community. The purpose of the program is to assist adolescents in re-establishing their recovery program as well as making vital community connections to support recovery

Our Home Rediscovery acknowledges that youth with substance abuse disorders typically present with co-existing problems and multiple needs that may or may not be the direct result of their substance use. Therefore, the treatment process must focus not only on the primary substance abuse disorder but also on the co-existing concerns that may exist..

The Our Home Rediscovery Program services include:

- Client evaluation with a history and physical
- Education, including drug and alcohol information and socialization skills
- Family education and counseling
- Individual and group therapy
- A school program
- Step groups; and
- Drug and alcohol counseling

The program also utilizes outside resources; specifically AA and NA, as well as other community resources to enhance the treatment process.

Licensure as a child welfare agency by DSS/CPS is waived for this program as it is regulated by the DSS Division of Alcohol and Drug abuse.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

Volunteers of America, Dakotas Heisler Residential Chemical Dependency Treatment Program offers a safe and supportive living environment for youth in need of residential chemical dependency treatment services as a result of harmful involvement with alcohol and/or drug use. The program also utilizes a point system and level system, combined with a motivational program, to assist the youth in developing appropriate social skills necessary for a healthy life style and productive future.

- To help individuals understand and accept the negative consequences of their chemical use
- To help individuals develop the skills and knowledge necessary to remain alcohol/drug free

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

Chamberlain Academy is a Group Care Center, licensed by the South Dakota Department of Social Services to provide residential services to youth 13 to 17. Our Challenge is to offer a nurturing environment where respect and education are highly valued. The Chamberlain Academy provides solutions for making productive lives for youth who may otherwise turn to self-destructing behaviors.

Chamberlain Academy’s treatment program places primary importance on thinking patterns and behavioral change. The program is based on a cognitive restructuring approach called the YSI Strategic Intervention Model. This model consists of professionals who provide prevention, education and intervention services for high-risk youth. Through our program we focus on things such as critical thinking, social/life skills, emotional literacy/management, empathy training, vocational training, and career development and education advancement. Student’s progress is tracked through four distinct levels of learning. Each level focuses on a “theme” of learning. The first level focuses on **Understanding Past Patterns of Thinking and Behavior**. The second level emphasizes **Understanding the Impact those Behaviors have on Others and Self**. In the third level students begin **Learning Positive Alternatives to Past Thinking and Behavior**. In the fourth and final level the efforts are focused on **Commitment to Success and Relapse Prevention**. The primary goal of the level system is to teach the youth the skills necessary to be successful. The YSI approach to progressive learning is designed to mark progress of the student towards readiness to be reintegrated back into their home or another environment.

The YSI Strategic Model incorporates an evaluation process which is research-based, with outcome driven criteria. The process YSI utilizes is designed to maintain program focus of interventions on the relevant issues related to the referral problems, the developmental agenda, as well as the more personal and unique issues of the individual. Evaluations are consistently geared towards identifying progress on goals that will better prepare the youth for their eventual transition back to the community, not their willingness or ability to adapt to the structured environment of the program. Key components to the evaluation system include assessing an initial baseline (upon entry into the program), assessment of ongoing progress (throughout the levels of the YSI model), consistent criteria for program promotions, and measures of program performance and staff functioning.

Additional Services

In additional to the above programs the Chamberlain Academy also offers youth:

- Mental health services contracted through Dakota Mental Health. These services include mental health assessments, individual psycho-therapy as needed, and medication monitoring. Dakota Mental Health also runs an in house Survivors of Sexual Abuse Group.
- Mental health services contracted through Dakota Mental Health. These services include mental health assessments, individual psycho-therapy as needed, and medication monitoring. Dakota Mental Health also runs an in house Survivors of Sexual Abuse Group.

- Accredited, on-campus educational programming. This is a certified program where students have the ability to receive their GED or High School diploma. Students will be placed on an Individual Education Planning (IEP), vocational education which includes pre-post employment skill development and World of Work Programs with employment opportunities in-house and in the community as well
- Life/Social Skills/Emotions Management including nutrition, wellness, sexuality, interpersonal skills, money management, community resources, housing, cultural diversity and parenting (pre-toddler),
- Students who reach the appropriate levels in the program will have community service and restitution opportunities. Chamberlain Academy has access to both on-campus and off-campus activities that will allow them to work off community services hours as well as begin to repay any restitution obligations they may have.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

Child Services (formerly the SHC Adolescent Program) is housed in a 13,000 square foot facility located at 111 Sycamore Street in Eagle Butte SD. The goal of Child Services is to supply group care and special services to youth who would benefit from intermediary services before becoming fully integrated back into their families.

Child Services is staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, all staff are CPR certified and also trained in Safe Crisis Management. Child Services is considered a “least restrictive environment” and is a benefit to those children who, although still in need of supervision, do not require the intensity of a residential treatment center. Child Services is licensed by the State of South Dakota for 16 children from the ages of 10 to 18 years of age.

CHILD SERVICES CAN PROVIDE:

- **Group Care** – long term care for those youth who do not qualify for Psychiatric Residential Treatment or more intensive treatment.
- **Respite Care** – a planned, short-term respite placement for parents, kinship providers, guardian, of foster parents who need respite when other natural respite resources are not available or appropriate.
- **Crisis Stabilization** – a short term stabilization service for youth who are experiencing difficulties with the goal of preventing placement outside the home or placement in a more restrictive setting.
- **Emergency Placement** – a safe and secure environment for youth who need temporary shelter pending investigations or alternative placement.
- **Short Term Assessment** – a comprehensive assessment through evaluations, observation and monitoring of youth in a structured setting resulting in a report with recommendations for services that will address identified family and individual youth needs, as well as, recommendations regarding appropriate level of care.
- **Community Reintegration Services** – a short-term facility-based reintegration service for youth discharged from psychiatric residential treatment facility or other residential options so that they may successfully transition to their home and community.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

Volunteers of America’s Independent Living Program is designed to prepare the older adolescent to live independently upon discharge from residential treatment or shortly thereafter. The program combines three basic components: transitional living case management for preparation to live independently, independent living skills instruction and semi-supervised housing in one of two Volunteers of America operated properties in the Sioux Falls community. Adolescents that are eligible must be at least sixteen years old, non-violent and willing to maintain employment and process toward high school diploma or GED while participating in all aspects of the program.

A youth wishing to participate in the independent living program will meet with the intake team prior to admission into the program to assess the youth's life skills. A comprehensive case service plan will be developed based on this assessment and interview with input from the youth, placing agency, legal guardian, and program staff. Each case service plan will be individualized and may include support services from other existing VOA – Volunteers of America programs such as the Heisler Adolescent Treatment Program and Lifemarks, an outpatient counseling program.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

Capital Area Counseling Services (CACS) is a private, non-profit community mental health center in Pierre, SD that has been licensed as a child placement agency since 1994. The Therapeutic Foster Care Program (TFC) has licensed treatment family homes for children ages 0-18 years with emotional/behavioral issues. TFC also will care for children with special medical needs or sibling groups. The goal of the TFC Program is to provide a family based treatment environment in which the nature and causes of a child's emotional issues can be identified and addressed and their needs met resulting in positive changes allowing them to gain the capacity to function more competently in a family, school, and community.

The TFC Unit at CACS is composed of a Unit Director, Clinical Coordinator, Placement/Licensing Specialist, and five Clinical Specialists. The Clinical Specialists provide intensive services to each child, their treatment parents, and in the community (school, day care, etc). These services include case management, guidance/support, individual/family/group therapy, crisis intervention, family/cultural/life connections, advocacy, and quarterly Treatment Team Reviews. TFC can also access psychological, psychiatric, and addiction services through other CACS programs if needed. Other TFC services that can be negotiated are short term placement assessments (usually 45-90 days), respite/visit foster homes, transportation assistance, reunification work with parents/relatives, guardianship/adoption preparation for prospective parents, and reunification aftercare (mainly for families in Pierre and the surrounding area). TFC is dedicated to keeping siblings together and decreasing placement moves while each child is assisted in achievement of their permanent plan.

Therapeutic Foster Care's basic daily rate is set annually by the South Dakota Department of Social Services, but TFC has agreed to accept placement of a younger sibling of a placed child at a lower rate to prevent the separation of siblings. This rate applies only to a sibling under 2 years of age who requires mostly normal care and the treatment parents are agreeable to the lower rate. There can be no more than 2 children in the TFC Program on this lower rate at one time. This sibling rate is \$20/day lower than the basic daily rate

Referrals can be made to the Placement/Licensing Specialist who will first take verbal basic information regarding the referred child's name, age, issues requiring a therapeutic placement, permanent plan, and date of placement needed. If there is an opening for possible placement, the P/L Specialist will gather more specific verbal and document information regarding the child's history, care needs, emotional/behavioral issues, and anything else that is pertinent to care/treatment needs. If placement is accepted, then a placement application packet will be sent to the referring party to complete and a placement date set.

Other services include: short term assessments; parental reunification services; sibling reunification services; adoption/guardianship preparation: family connections; cultural connections; educational coordination; specialized medical coordination; addictions education/prevention; and aftercare (for families in the areas of reunifications/adoptions.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

Children's Home Therapeutic Foster Care is designed to provide as much as weekly individual therapeutic support for the child in care and family therapy for the foster family. Families are licensed at a therapeutic level and receive as much as 30 hrs of training per year. The goal is to use the family setting as a therapeutic tool to aid the child in resolving emotional and behavioral issues while learning how to be successful in the intimacy of a family environment. Length of time in program is typically at least six months in length. In some cases, therapeutic placements may be created in order to serve as pre-adoptive support for that child and family.

Messenger's Children's Center – Rapid City

The center provides emergency and assessment foster care for children in state or tribal custody for periods of a few days for emergency/temporary foster care or for 30-90 days for assessment foster care. For emergency care, Messenger staff will maintain as much of the child's normal routine as possible, including school, family visits, and activities. For assessment care, CHS will ensure that physical, psychiatric, and psychological exams are done as needed. Direct care is provided by specially trained foster parents with supervision of Clinical staff. The staff is able to provide input concerning the type of care that a child requires, i.e. residential treatment, therapeutic foster care, basic level care; as well as the dynamics of the most suitable type of placement. Messenger staff may also provide input concerning transitional planning, etc. The Messenger's Home is not a locked facility and functions as a highly structured, specialized foster home. Some therapeutic support and case management intervention may be available to assist at times.
